

Pressure Cooker - Instructions 8-4-75

I for vegetables - place rack in bottom and add $\frac{1}{2}$ to 1 cup of water. Cook for 1 to five minutes depending on thickness of items being cooked. The longer you cook it, the more water you should use.

II Pressure indicator for normal cooking, the middle line in the little rod indicates sufficient pressure for most cooking situations. Each line indicates 5 pounds pressure.

III Cooking Time. Generally speaking, the cooker reduces cooking time by $\frac{2}{3}$. This will help in determining times. You should start measuring ^{time} when the pressure indicator has risen to its proper level. ~~Some~~ ^{Most} vegetables should be cooled quickly by running water over the pan at the completion of the cooking period.

IV Capacity. Never fill more than $\frac{3}{4}$ full, or $\frac{1}{2}$ full with foods that foam when cooked.

V Wait until the pressure indicator has retracted completely before removal. Always remove indicator before opening the cooker - over.

VI cooking instructions for some items.

- a Rice (Brown regular) - 3 cups of water.
1 cup of brown River Rice. Cook at 10lb
pressure for about 12 minutes.
- b Cauliflower, Broccoli, Corn, cabbage
artichokes green beans and the like
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of water, cook 1-3 minutes
(depending on taste) - cool quickly
- c For meats, ask Mother.

III

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Capacity - Never fill more than $\frac{3}{4}$ full,
or $\frac{1}{2}$ full with foods that foam when

Picking produce (as Ivan) or guitar (as Ike), it's all the same to Central Lake farmer

CENTRAL LAKE - Ivan Parsons is well known in Antrim County—but not as Ivan Parsons.

For years Ivan—alias “Ike and his One Man Band,” have entertained folks at county bistros. Accompanied by an ingenious musical device known as a ‘sideman’ in the music business, Ike has plucked his guitar and sung everything from pop, country,

folk and hillbilly to polkas and old standards—to a loyal following of fans that go wherever Ike goes as he hopscoches the areas nightlife circuit.

And although Ike still enjoys performing a regular weekend gig at a nearby watering hole, he’s getting his big kicks these days from providing family entertainment—the mouth watering kind—by raising and

selling acres of vegetables on his farm near here.

Parsons Farm Market, located a mile and a half east of Central Lake, then a quarter mile north of 624 on Muckle Road, officially opened its doors for business two weeks ago.

Folks who saw it before Ivan bought the place in February were betting that the 95 acre farm, half of which is now

growing produce, would never be open again. It was a mess. The farmhouse had been deserted. And everywhere Ivan looked there was work to be done.

That’s when yankee ingenuity stepped in. With a help from some neighbors (“these people are the friendliest I’ve ever seen around here,” claims Ivan), a healthy dose of elbow grease and the kind of work days time clocks aren’t geared to calculate, Ivan and helper Mae Warner were well on their way to hanging out their shingle as a bonafide business.

FRESH PRODUCE DAILY

“Freshness is the main thing here,” claims Ivan, explaining his farm market’s operation. “Everything we have here is local. We pick it daily, or every other day, and it’s just as fresh as it can be.”

In addition to the multitude of vegetables—everything from sweet corn, to tender, tiny sprouts of broccoli and squash even the natives haven’t heard of—Parsons Farm Market carries milk and eggs at farm prices.

Honey and maple syrup are also handled. The honey’s from the hives of well known Ellsworth apiarist Jacob C. DeKorne, while Ivan’s father

“Pure products is what we try to handle here,” says Ivan. “No junk food.”

For organic gardening types, questioning what kinds of pesticides and fertilizers were used by Ivan to produce the bountiful yields evident in the fields around the Parsons farm, he has a patent answer: “As little as possible, and only the kinds that are proven and rated to be non-harmful or non-toxic.”

BULK ORDERS FOR CANNERS

Since canning season is already here, Ivan and Mae Warner are now taking bulk orders—by the bushel or half bushel—for do-it-yourselfers wanting to can or freeze produce.

In addition to operating his farm market, Ivan also supplies area supermarkets with fresh produce. And when he’s not picking produce, his guitar, or traveling his delivery route, Ivan and Mae Warner are planning for next year. Two irrigation ponds have already been dug. They’re in preparation for the trickle irrigation system Ivan wants to introduce next spring. Strawberries and raspberries are part of the master plan as

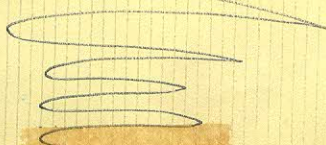
